To participate in this group, you must be verbal and able to communicate back and forth 3-4 times, be

AUTISTIC ADULT MEETUP GROUP. This is a closed group that is ONLY for individuals with Level I autism and social challenges. This is a group for anyone with diagnosed or suspected autism who is over age 30. This group is run by Ann Mary Dykstra, longtime ASK volunteer and Puzzle Partners Group Leader.
